

Citing Online Sources in a Works Cited page using MLA

An online source is any source that was printed or published on the Internet, and they are called “Web Publications”. This includes musical recordings, videos, websites, online magazines and newspapers, online news sources, online archives, and online encyclopedias.

To cite online sources, list:

1. Name of the author (or creator of the work): Last name, First name.
 2. Title of the work
 - a. *Italicize* the title if the work stands alone (i.e. is the whole project)
 - b. Put quotation marks around it if the work is part of a larger work (i.e. one webpage of a full website or the title of a news article)
 3. Title of the overall Web site if the title of the work is different: *Italicize the title*
 4. Version or edition used
 5. Publisher or sponsor of the site; if not available, use the abbreviation, N.p.
 6. Date of publication (day, month, and year, as available); if nothing is available, use the abbreviation, n.d.
 7. The word “Web” (to indicate that the source was published on the internet)
 8. Date you accessed the information (day, month, and year)
- Separate each piece of information with a period, except after the publisher. After the publisher, use a comma.
 - List as much information as you can, and skip what you cannot find.
 - Start the citation at the left margin, and indent any line after the first.
 - Example:

Tyre, Peg. “Standardized Tests in College?” *Newsweek*. Newsweek, 16 Nov. 2007. Web.
15 May 2008.

Due to how often websites and web addresses change, and because of how often web links become incorrect when information is moved, MLA no longer requires the URL in a citation. However, some professors request this information. If this is the case, simply list the URL at the end of the citation. Place the URL between two <angle brackets>:
