(Freshman to Sophomore; Sophomore to Junior; Junior to Senior)

2010	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The 2010 freshman cohort was made up of 488 students. Of these students, 193 were retained to their second year, resulting in a retention rate of 38.5%. • Of the 2010 cohort of 488 students, 121 were retained to their third year, resulting in a third year retention rate of 24.6%. If we consider only those 193 students who were retained to their second year, that figure of 121 retained to their third year results in a retention rate of 62.7%. • Finally, of the 2010 cohort of 488 students, 108 were retained to their fourth year, resulting in a fourth year retention rate of 22%. If we consider only those 121 students who were retained to their third year, that figure of 108 retained to their fourth year results in a retention rate of 89%.
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2011	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The 2011 freshman cohort was made up of 493 students. Of these students, 195 were retained to their second year, resulting in a retention rate of 39.5%. • Of the 2011 cohort of 493 students, 124 were retained to their third year, resulting in a third year retention rate of 25%. If we consider only those 195 students who were retained to their second year, that figure of 124 retained to their third year results in a retention rate of 63.6%. • Finally, of the 2011 cohort of 493 students, 112 were retained to their fourth year, resulting in a fourth year retention rate of 22.7%. If we consider only those 124 students who were retained to their third year, that figure of 112 retained to their fourth year results in a retention rate of 90.3%.
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2012	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The 2012 freshman cohort was made up of 536 students. Of these students, 281 were retained to their second year, resulting in a retention rate of 52%. • Of the 2012 cohort of 536 students, 225 were retained to their third year, resulting in a third year retention rate of 42%. If we consider only those 281 students who were retained to their second year, that figure of 225 retained to their third year results in a retention rate of 80.1%. • Finally, of the 2012 cohort of 536 students, 192 were retained to their fourth year, resulting in a fourth year retention rate of 35.8%. If we consider only those 225 students who were retained to their third year, that figure of 192 retained to their fourth year results in a retention rate of 85.3%.

2013	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> The 2013 freshman cohort was made up of 428 students. Of these students, 221 were retained to their second year, resulting in a retention rate of 52%. Of the 2013 cohort of 428 students, 170 were retained to their third year, resulting in a third year retention rate of 39.7%. If we consider only those 221 students who were retained to their second year, that figure of 170 retained to their third year results in a retention rate of 76.9%. Finally, of the 2013 cohort of 428 students, 154 were retained to their fourth year, resulting in a fourth year retention rate of 35.9%. If we consider only those 170 students who were retained to their third year, that figure of 154 retained to their fourth year results in a retention rate of 90.6%.
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2014	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> The 2014 freshman cohort was made up of 393 students. Of these students, 213 were retained to their second year, resulting in a retention rate of 54%. Of the 2014 cohort of 393 students, 160 were retained to their third year, resulting in a third year retention rate of 40.7%. If we consider only those 213 students who were retained to their second year, that figure of 160 retained to their third year results in a retention rate of 75.1%. Finally, of the 2014 cohort of 393 students, 145 were retained to their fourth year, resulting in a fourth year retention rate of 36.9%. If we consider only those 160 students who were retained to their third year, that figure of 145 retained to their fourth year results in a retention rate of 90.6%.
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2015	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> The 2015 freshman cohort was made up of 475 students. Of these students, 229 were retained to their second year, resulting in a retention rate of 48%. Of the 2015 cohort of 475 students, 184 were retained to their third year, resulting in a third year retention rate of 38.7%. If we consider only those 229 who were retained to their second year, that figure of 184 retained to their third year results in a retention rate of 80.3%. Finally, of the 2015 cohort of 475 students, 166 were retained to their fourth year, resulting in a fourth year retention rate of 34.9%. If we consider only those 184 students who were retained to their third year, that figure of 166 retained to their fourth year results in a retention rate of 90.2%.
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2016	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> The 2016 freshman cohort was made up of 353 students. Of these students, 200 were retained to their second year, resulting in a retention rate of 56.7%. Of the 2016 cohort of 353 students, 148 were retained to their third year, resulting in a third year retention rate of 41.9%. If we consider only those 200 who were retained to their second year, that figure of 148 retained to their third year results in a retention rate of 74.0%.

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2017	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• The 2017 freshman cohort was made up of 406 students. Of these students, 210 were retained to their second year, resulting in a retention rate of 51.7%.
